

Scoring Guide Tutorial

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Step One:

There are three major areas on the scoring page:

1. **Student Writing Sample:** authentic samples for practice in holistic scoring
2. **Scoring Area:** includes a section for scoring "Writing Applications," "Language Conventions" and "Overall Score."
3. **Title:** includes grade level, genre, title of paper and option for scoring other samples.

Step Two:

The upper left-hand area displays the following:

1. **Description of Paper:** this description includes the grade level, genre and title of paper.
2. **Instructions:** you can access these instructions at any time while you practice scoring or viewing the scoring results.
3. **View Transcription:** when you select this option you can read a typed transcription of this paper.
4. **View the Prompt:** in order to accurately assess the student sample, you should select this to determine how well the student responded to the writing prompt.
5. **View ISTEP+ Rubrics:** you can download and/or print the ISTEP+ rubric for help as you evaluate and score the sample.

Step Three:

This upper right-hand area displays the following:

1. **Score another Sample:** you can select up to six different student samples to score. These samples are not listed from low score to high score; instead, they are listed randomly.
2. **View Framed Version:** there is an option to view the "Practice Scoring" section as framed or non-framed version.

Step Four:

Whenever a question mark appears in the rating area, you can select this to find rating tips for that area.

Step Five:

Tips for rating writing applications are included for this step:

1. **3-5th Grade Rating Areas:** there are three areas to rate for these grade levels including ideas & content, organization and style.
2. **6-8th Grade Rating Areas:** there are four areas to rate for these grade levels including ideas & content, organization, style and voice.
3. **Select a Rating for Each Area:** each area includes five rating selections including very strong, strong, adequate, weak and very weak. If you need help rating any area, access the question marks for tips.

Step Six:

Here are language conventions and overall scoring tips:

1. **Language Conventions:** if you perceive any of the language conventions as strengths, place a check mark next to the strong area(s). If you need help scoring any area, access the question marks for tips.
2. **My Overall Score:** select a score from 1-6 on writing applications and from 1-4 on language conventions. If you need more help deciding how to score, refer to the ISTEP+ rubrics.
3. **Submit:** once you have completed scoring all areas, select submit.

Step Seven:

When you submit your scores, you are taken to the "Scoring Results" page, which is divided in four areas:

1. **Title:** includes grade level, genre, title of paper and option for scoring other samples.
2. **Writing Applications:** you can compare and contrast how you scored the student sample with an expert's score.
3. **Language Conventions:** compare and contrast how you scored the sample to the expert's score.
4. **Rationales:** read the expert's rationale for scoring each area.

Step Eight:

Here is a brief description for this area:

1. **Description of Paper:** this description includes the grade level, genre and title of paper.
2. **Instructions:** you can access these instructions at any time while view the scoring results.
3. **Writing Applications:** compare and contrast how you scored the sample to the expert's score.

Step Nine:

In this area of "Scoring Results" you will see:

1. **Score another Sample:** you can select up to six different student samples to score. These samples are not listed from low score to high score; instead, they are listed randomly.
2. **Language Conventions:** compare and contrast how you scored the sample to the expert's score.

Step Ten:

For every scoring area, the expert has written scoring rationales. This is the most important instructional resource for this tutorial on holistic writing assessment. Carefully read these rationales.

Step Eleven:

In this area of "Scoring Results" you will see:

1. **Compare Your Score:** next to each rationale, you can view your score and compare it to the expert's score.
2. **Compare with Another:** for further instruction you can view another student sample that was scored the same. These comparison papers include scoring rationales.
3. **Review Paper:** as you read the scoring rationales, you may want to access the student paper to compare how the rationale addresses the strengths and weaknesses of the sample.
4. **View Rubric:** you can download and/or print the ISTEP+ rubric for help as you evaluate the scoring of the sample.
